## BRICS: Marking a New Impetus in South Africa's Foreign Policy or Just Another Brick in the Wall?

South Africa's admission into the BRIC Club has been finally realized by President Zuma's charm offensive. Not only does Bric membership elevate Pretoria's diplomatic ambitions but it also indicates to the rest of the world that SA is the strategic African voice on the global transformative agenda. But apart from the normative view about what SA brings to the BRIC alliance, notwithstanding the economic opportunities that opens up for corporate engagement, it seems somewhat curious about the intention to invite South Africa to join and Pretoria's overwhelming need to be accepted into what is becoming a prestigious entity.
